For the love of animals!

In an article by Hudson University, the benefits of involving animals like dogs and horses in your therapeutic program is outlined. These benefits include improving mental health, specifically agitation and anxiety by releasing feel-good hormones. It further aids skills development including communication and interaction and promotes physical exercise to name but a few.

Feathery fun!

We introduced 5 chickens to our Open Circle family this year. The chickens are cared for daily by a resident who feeds them and takes their eggs to the kitchen for use. Our feathery friends are fun for the residents to look at and pick up at times, when they escape the coop and wander around the Home.





Horses make us happy

We looked into Equine Therapy to find suitable activities for our residents on the autism spectrum. Engaging with and riding horses has motor





and sensory benefits. It has since become a firm family favourite that everyone (including the staff) look forward to. Some residents ride and others prefer to watch or feed or stroke, but the joy is contagious in these moments.

Puppy love

This year we joined hands with Top Dogs Therapy, a pet therapy organisation that relies on volunteers (humans and their pooches) to enrich the lives of others. Dusty and Nomad, two beautiful Labradors soon became familiar with our residents and the environment. We are specifically excited about the improvement in engagement, concentration, and positive emotional responses we have seen during their monthly visits.

In September 2023, we welcomed Riley, our new four-legged friend, to The Open Circle family. She was found in a park, abandoned. The vet estimated her to be no more than











4 weeks old at the time. Our Occupational Therapist introduced the residents to Riley, and they immediately fell in love.

She is currently 1 year old and successfully completed puppy school in December 2023 - the first phase of becoming a qualified therapy dog. She has now moved on to the next phase of her training to become a qualified "Fur-Therapist" (Facility Dog) where she will be prepared for the official assessment and receive her KUSA Canine Good Citizen certification.

The joy and excitement she brings to the home is unmatched. She has brought a sense of calmness and has often worked as a distractor when needed. How lucky is she to have gone from being all alone in a park to being surrounded by the kind of people who have the most love to give!

Exotic Animal World

Our Exotic Animal World adventure allowed us to move outside of our comfort zone and explore animals unfamiliar to us. We had a wonderful day!
